## EASTER EGG HUNT SATURDAY MARCH 23

Our annual Underwater Easter Egg Hunt in Monterey will be on Saturday, March 23. As always we'll have lots of GREAT prizes, one for every egg and some for our raffle too! The hunt area will be at the west end of San Carlos Beach, opposite the breakwater and down the stairs from the restrooms. Everyone will need to be on the beach between 9:00 and 9:30 a.m. to sign in and receive a dive orientation. The area of the hunt will be cordoned off underwater with yellow rope and there will be floats on the surface marking the area from above. Boats may be moored outside of the hunt area BUT <u>ALL</u> contestants must remain ON THE SURFACE until the whistle is blown. At 54:44 sharp we will blow a whistle to signal the start of the event, at which time you should descend. If you are floating over the hunt area and descend when you hear the whistle you are almost assured of finding an egg. If you have not yet reached the hunt area when the whistle is blown the easy ones will be already found and you will have to work much harder to find them. There are usually egg numbers that are not found so don't give up too early! There will be extra weights and a safety diver in a boat, anchored in the center of the area with a safety diver. We will have children's activities organized on the beach while parents are searching for their eggs underwater. If you, or someone you know, would be willing to help with the children's activities please let us know.

Prizes for the adults and children will be awarded at the evening buffet and awards ceremony at Crazy Horse Restaurant, located above the Bay Park Hotel, near Hwy 101 & Munras Avenue. The menu selections will be the same as last year with tri-tip, halibut, hot vegetables, soft drinks, the Crazy Horse signature salad bar, and even Chocolate mousse for desert. Social hour will start at 5:00 followed by dinner at 6:00 p.m. and the prize presentations immediately after dinner. Be sure to bring money for some *GREAT* raffle prizes! I will post the sign-up form on our web site and send a map and directions in an e-mail to everyone who has signed up for this event. If you do not have access to the internet, or a printer, the forms will also be available at the January, February and March general meetings. Even though our cost has gone up for the meals the club is subsidizing the increase to keep your member cost the same.


There are nine spaces left on our 2019 Channel Islands dive trip on the Conception. This trip will again be for 4 days from Saturday, July 20 to Tuesday, July 23. This is our first trip including Saturday and Sunday, so we will see if this timing works better for us.

We will head back to Catalina for the warmer water and (hopefully) the Giant Black Seabass and dive sites at Ship Rock and Farnsworth Banks. There are always a few hunters and photographers / videographers on our trips, but this is a trip for everyone so we will go where the conditions are best for general diving.

Member cost is still only \$650.00. This annual trip is our biggest fun(d) raiser for the year and an excellent time for great diving and to get to know all your Dolphin buddies a little better. Bottom time is limited only by your nitrogen loading and how many times you want to dive. If you are a new diver this is probably the best way for you to hone your skills while diving with your more experienced club buddies. The scenery along the islands is so beautiful we are often joined by non-diving family members. The crew takes excellent care of us and it is unbelievable how good the food is coming from the tiny galley.

# OCEAN SAFETY

#### Hazardous Surf Conditions Are Right In Front of You

Surprisingly large "rogue" waves occur daily at any time of year. They can knock you down and sweep you off beaches and rocks into cold, deep water. These waves can be deadly for the unwary and account for many preventable drownings.

#### If You Do Get Swept In

Stay Calm. Call for help. Expect more large waves. Take a moment to get your bearings. Look for a place where the waves may be smaller, preferably a low, sandy area where you can exit without being battered against the rocks. If you see someone swept into the ocean, DO NOT go in yourself. Throw a floatable object if it is close by. **Go for help. Call 911.** 

#### Rip Currents

Rip currents are strong, swift-moving channels of water moving from shore to sea. Don't swim against the current. Swim gradually out of the current by swimming across it.

#### Surf-related Accidents are Preventable

To save your life:

- Expect the next wave to be two or three times larger than the one before it. Keep dry land between you and wet sand or rocks. Avoid exposed rocks, jetties, and headlands during and after storms.
- If you are near the water, face the ocean at all times to reduce the chance that a large wave will surprise you.
- Keep children close to you and small children within easy grasp.

Non-swimmers should wear life jackets.

- · Share these safety tips with children.
- Tide pools are in low-lying areas where waves can easily reach you. Rocks are slippery. Be especially cautious.

#### **OTHER HAZARDS**

#### Know the Tides

Incoming tides isolate rocks from headlands and the shore. If you're not sure about the tide, avoid these rocks. Use a tide book. Stay off rocks and small enclosed beaches on an incoming tide.

#### Frigid Water

Average ocean temperature is 52 degrees F (11 degrees C). Any one in the ocean without a wetsuit will become hypo-thermic quickly. Survival time may be as short as 15 minutes.

#### Beachcombing

Beware of crumbling bluffs overhead, the unexpected rogue wave, and surf-tossed logs.

#### Stay Safe on the Bluffs

All cliffs and bluffs are unstable and may crumble. Stay away from the edge.

#### **Fishing**

When fishing from rocks or shore take extreme care. Do not go into the surf to free a snagged line.

#### Diving, Kayaking, and Surfing

If the ocean looks rough, it is rough. Know your limits and wait for calmer seas.

### SAFETY RULES

- -Never turn your back on the ocean
- -Learn to swim and float
- Keep children within easy grasp
- Know when tides change
- Expect rapidly changing conditions
- Stay back on cliffs and bluffs
- Avoid slippery rocks
