My Trip to Turkey,

This July my father and I went diving at Akvaryum Cove in the Datca Peninsula of Turkey. This was our first time diving in the Mediterranean Sea as well as our first diving experience outside of the United States. This article was written in hopes of describing the logistics of our two dives, sharing what we saw, and explaining how diving was different in a country that straddles Europe and the Middle East.

I will begin by describing the dives themselves. We were taken to the secluded Akvaryum Cove by a small diving charter boat that was organized by a PADI Master Scuba Diver Trainer, who also acted as our dive guide. Diving with a guide who possessed intimate knowledge of the area and underwater terrain made it a much easier and relaxing dive in which we were able to focus more on the marine life and the scenery. Both dives took place along a wall that descends immediately from the shore. The wall had large steppes at different depths that divers with different skill levels could descend to.

We used no hoods, gloves, or booties as well as a wet suit that was only 5mm thick as opposed to the 7mm thick wet suit that we normally use for diving in California. Because of this we were surprised to find that our dive computers registered 69 degrees Fahrenheit at 60ft which was about the same temperature that you would find diving in California. The reason we did not need as much insulation as a dive in California can be attributed to a scorching surface temperature of 105 degrees Fahrenheit. Also, the temperature gradient between just 10ft and below 60ft was so large that coming up to the surface felt like going into a Turkish bath.

The marine life was naturally very different than what can be found in the Northern California coasts and so was the scenery. We observed many different kinds of fish such as ornate and rainbow wrasse, painted comber, red scorpionfish, trumpet fish and various kinds of seabream. Other common sights included sea urchins and many colorful starfish. A spotted octopus and a moray eel whose head emerged from a small cave were two of the most interesting sights. An interesting surprise was when our dive guide unearthed a broken piece of an old clay pot. Such containers were commonly used to store trade goods such as olive oil and wine in ancient Turkey.

As well as different sights to see while we dove we also observed several differences between our dive habits and the local dive habits. While divers who make frequent overseas dives are probably accustomed to these differences, however, to us they were all new experiences since this was our first dive in foreign waters. The biggest change that we had to get accustomed to was that all equipment was in the metric measurement system as opposed to the imperial system that we use while diving in America. These dives also marked the first time that we used a weight belt as weight integrated BCDs were not available on the boat that we were diving from.

Diving in a totally new environment was a very exciting experience and the crystal clear waters of the Mediterranean Sea made for two memorable dives for the both of us. These dives took us well out of our comfort zones and taught us that a diver needs to be prepared, flexible, and adaptable to different situations.

Inland Lobster Feed & Potluck Saturday, August 8

Bring your family, bring your friends and join us at Lake Natomas for our "Inland Lobster Feed" dive and potluck on Saturday August 8 at the Negro Bar picnic area. A few of us will put out crawdad traps late Friday to recover for the event in the morning.



Saturday morning all of the divers will meet at the Negro Bar State Park by 9:00 to boat up past the Rainbow Bridge for a fun drift dive. You should plan on arriving at the Negro Bar picnic area early because we want to be in our boats and ready to dive by 9:00! There are a lot of big crayfish hiding under the rocks so bring a "Goody Bag" to grab the biggest and fastest ones you see. There are also a lot of lost "treasures" that fishermen and swimmers have dropped in the lake so we can also do a lake cleanup and scavenger hunt while we dive. I have found several working watches and a gold ring on previous dives so be sure to keep your eyes open. The deepest you can get is only about 40 feet, and there will be a current sweeping us along so you will have to hug the bottom to keep from drifting too fast. Visibility is typically about 6 to 10 feet and the water temperature has been in the low sixties on previous dives.

After we have made our dives we'll gather in the picnic area for the rest of the fun. We will have prizes for a BIG crawdad contest and a crawdad race for the adults and the kids, so be sure to save your biggest and your fastest crawdad. We will also have a "Liars Contest" where we will spin yarns about

the "treasures" that we find. After all the fun we will fire up the barbeque and cook up the crawdads, hamburgers, cornon-the-cob and whatever other delectables that are contributed to the potluck. Please bring \$5.00 per adult to contribute



hamburgers and corn on the cob. Please also bring a potluck dish, and don't forget your dive gear, hats, beach chairs and sunscreen.
